Samuel J. Brown.

Brown was the architect for a number of houses in McKay's development - almost all for McKay himself. Although he was quite capable of designing restrained, nicely detailed houses (see 173 Naples, etc.), many of his houses give the general impression this one does - a somewhat ungainly building, usually large, containing references to a number of styles. (See 31-33 Winthrop Road and 147 Thorndike Street). Here Brown uses the eyelid window most often seen in the Shingle style, scrolled bargeboards and drop pendants associated with Medieval Revival, and a hip roof not usually associated with either style. The porch across the front is not typical of either style, but may be a later addition. The same style bargeboards can be seen at 21 Naples Road on a house designed by Edward Barker. #18 next door was also built by McKay and designed by Brown.

In 1896 Horace S. Woodbury, a commission merchant with an office at 1 Beacon St., Boston, was the owner of this house.
