

BUILDING FORM

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION see continuation sheet 29 Lowell Road Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The suburban house at 29 Lowell Road was built in 1929 by Royal Barry Wills as architect with Maurice Dunlavy as contractor for W.H. Haker as owner. The Haker house follows a traditional two story, side gable, center hall plan of wood frame construction with brick veneer and an attached garage wing at right built under separate permit of 1928 by Wills and Dunlavy. The design is carried in Georgian Revival Style highlighted by an arched entry with segmental wood blocks, a central chimney and window shutters as details to the brick facade. The two bay garage is designed to match with the house, among the earliest full facade integral garages by the Wills firm, while the original doors have been replaced by grooved boarding, hinges and slate roof. The Haker house at 29 Lowell Road is notable as an early suburban design by Royal Barry Wills with an attached garage wing in the Blake Park district.

The suburban house at 29 Lowell Road is dated 1929 by building permit for Walter H. Haker, a Brookline real estate agent, with his wife Maude, had moved to the address from 48-54 Marshall Street (see BKL.2979). The property was part of the original Blake Park estate plotted in 1916 and sold as building lots in 1925. The Haker house is notable, is the design of the house by Royal Barry Wills, a noted Boston area suburban architect of the New England Colonial Revival Style who included an attached garage under separate permit dated in December 1928, before the house. Possibly, Haker may have known Wills through real estate connections for the original plans. The Hakers maintained residence at the address during the Depression through 1941. The suburban house at 29 Lowell Road is of historic note as an early design by Royal Barry Wills built with an attached a garage for a Brookline real estate agent before the Depression.



The suburban house at 29 Lowell Road was designed in 1929 by noted Boston architect, Royal Barry Wills with Maurice Dunlavy as builder for Walter H. Haker, a Brookline real estate agent. The Haker house is designed in Georgian Revival Style on a traditional two story, center hall plan with brick veneer facing over wood frame construction. Period details include an arched frame doorway, central chimney and wood shutters. Most notable is an attached two car garage as an early integral design element for a suburban plan by Wills, filed under separate permit in 1928. The Haker house at 29 Lowell Road is one of a series of early suburban designs by Royal Barry Wills built before the Depression in the Blake Park district of Brookline. The house qualifies for National Register consideration under Criteria C for its design by noted Boston architect, Royal Barry Wills, with an integral attached garage.
