9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

#134 Clinton Road, another type of Georgian Revival style home to be found on the street, is similar in design to #s 19, 25, 38, and 106. See especially similar scale, symmetry, and windows at #19. It was built in 1926 and designed by architect/builder Norman Deane. Fred Chamberlain was the first owner; he was president and treasurer of Fred Holland Chamberlain Inc., ^{which was} High grade restricted home sites in Brookline, Newton, Fisher Hill, and Chestnut Hill."

Chamberlain sold the house to Joseph Gordon, a wholesale jeweler who worked in Boston, in 1927.
